It was said of Abel because of his faith and exemplary life-style that "*...he being dead yet speaks*" (Heb. 11:4). This could be said of the life of our brother Jean Thornton. For more than 63 years, he carried the torch of truth and righteousness, preaching for churches in Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee. He is held in high esteem among the members of the New Albany congregation where 14 of those years were spent. During these years he served as a located preacher, elder, writer, Freed-Hardeman University Advisory Board Member and a past chairman of the board, song writer, instructor and a servant and friend to so many.

Jean A. Thornton was ushered into this world by Virgie Shannon and Christopher Columbus Thornton in Tiptersville, MS. He is survived by two daughters: Jeanita (Jim) Estes of Booneville, MS and Joyce (Ralph) Gilmore of Jackson, TN; one sister, Julia (Bobby) Milstead of Florence, AL; one brother, John L. (Peggy) Thornton of Hendersonville, TN.; nine grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren; two step-children, Ann Langford of St. Petersburg, FL and Barry Pardue of Booneville.

He was preceded in death by his parents; his first wife of 58 years, Delphia H. Thornton; and his second wife Jewell Thornton. He was very familiar with death and grief having lost an infant son and daughter, one sister and four brothers; and an infant grandson and an infant great-grandson.

Brother Thornton had a passion for the salvation of souls, but his greatest concern was for young people and for their living a promising life here and have hope in the hereafter. This no doubt explains the family's request for memorials to be sent to the J.A. Thornton Scholarship Fund at Freed-Hardeman University, 158 E. Main St., Henderson, TN 38340.

It is said that his motto was: "I'm on top of the world." He has left as some of his posterity writings as to how that could be accomplished. Though he started out as a two pound one ounce baby, he grew to become quite a man! His sincerity, devotion and personal compassion was unrivaled. He has left behind a trail of integrity and consistency through more than six decades of ministering. His mentoring and influence will remain. His mark has been etched into the lives of so many who have been a part of the New Albany congregation during the fourteen years spent on his watch. Countless numbers have been taught, baptized, married and buried by him during his colorful tenure of service to the Lord and mankind. His middle name "Armour" was rightly given for he protected himself from the cares and distractions of the world to serve God.

To his family, we extend our heartfelt sympathy and to whom we express thanks for their sharing his life with so many of us. The world, the church, the New Albany congregation and so many more have been blessed because J. A. Thornton came our way. Yes, he is now gone, but though this be the case, he shall continue to speak for generations to come. He could say what General Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson said in his dying words, "Let us now cross over the river and rest beneath the shade of the trees."

YOUTH POPULATION

The rapid population increase in the U.S. has added a million teen-agers each year since 1955. By 1967 more than half of the citizens of the U.S. will be under 25 years of age. As the apostle Paul said, "*A door was opened unto me of the Lord*" 2 Cor. 2:12. So today a door is open to the church of the Lord in this country, and perhaps all over the world, with a great opportunity to step up our activities in this field ready for gathering into the Master's vineyard. We should be fully aware of the potential of this challenging and inviting segment of our great population—the youth of the land.

In the past the general attitude has been that the youth of today will be the church of tomorrow. This is no longer true for much of this great force is already a part of and participating in the work of the church. It is established that young men have added much to the vision and progress of the work of elders where given the opportunity. While the church needs the seasoned judgment of older men, it also needs the zeal and inspiration of the younger men.

Now is the time for the church to act, to lead the way, not just point to the way. The most effective training period is in childhood and youth. One very wise man said, "*Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it.*" The responsibility for training and teaching children and youth is to be shared by the home and the church neither to trespass the line of duty of the other. Each is distinct, but broad enough to make possible a stronger and more dedicated youth. Isaiah said, "*The father shall make known the truth to the child.*" David said, "*I will teach you the fear of the Lord.*" Paul said, "*Ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath; but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.*" These scriptures and others point out the duty of parents to teach their children like the case of Timothy of whom it was said, "*That from a child thou hast known the holy scriptures, which are able to make thee wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus.*"

The startling fact is that the church is losing, or has never gained, this vast youth population. They are neither listed in Bible classes nor church membership—just neglected. The need of the hour is calling us to **Wake Up!** Get children and teen-agers in Bible study classes and regular church services in the most critical period of their development when they are more easily taught and established in faith for the trials of life. And as parents, study the Bible with them at home. As teachers, develop and safeguard their character and souls with a thorough understanding and teaching ability of the word of God. Too, as leaders our behavior should encourage the youth to become Christians, a part of the body of Christ and work to save others.

Talents, capabilities, interest and zeal of the Christian youth should be channeled and directed into useful avenues for the glory of God for truly they **ARE** a part of the church today. Let us hasten to properly evaluate the strength of this youth.

Opportunities for training should be provided in the public as well as group exercises for our young men to get experience for better service for the Lord in the Church. These provisions are calculated to make the youth feel that they "belong to and are a vital part of the church."
